

# **Prescriptions for Prevention**

## **Asbestos**

### Did you know?

Asbestos is found in some older buildings (insulation, tiles) and rarely in some consumer products. Breathing in asbestos fibers can lead to cancer years from now.

### **Action Plan**

- If asbestos-containing materials are in good condition and cannot be reached by kids, leave them alone because they're not likely releasing any fibers.
- If asbestos-containing materials are damaged, don't remove them yourself.
- If you are concerned about asbestos in your home, or if asbestos materials are damaged or renovations are planned, hire a certified inspector. Scan the QR code or click here for the complete list of PA DEP-certified firms:

- Avoid using talc-containing products (talc may be naturally contaminated with asbestos-like fibers).
- If you work with asbestos (construction, demolition, brake repair): Your employer should provide you appropriate training, respirator, and personal protective equipment for use at work. Shower and change clothes/shoes before coming home. Do not wash work clothes with household clothes.
- Don't smoke cigarettes. People who are exposed to asbestos have a much higher risk of lung cancer if they smoke.
