Mold

Did you know?

Mold depends on moisture to grow. Mold can trigger asthma and allergy symptoms.

Action Plan

- Reduce moisture by increasing ventilation (airflow): open windows slightly when showering, use exhaust fans.
- Fix water leaks. Renters, report leaks to your landlord.
- After a flood or water leak: remove wet items and completely dry the area within 48 hrs.

If you see mold:

- Eliminate the source of moisture/water first.
- Scrub mold from hard surfaces with soap and water, or vinegar, and dry completely.
- Avoid using bleach (unless you are cleaning sewage).
- Do not paint over mold.
- Discard moldy objects that can't be cleaned.
- If mold covers an area more than 3ft x 3ft, hire a professional mold abatement company. Cleaning this amount of mold yourself can be hazardous
- If you rent, report mold to your landlord. If conditions are not fixed, ask your local building department or code enforcement official to inspect your home for water damage or leaks.

Report Mold for an Inspection

If you are a tenant and see mold growth in your home you can report this to the city by calling 311. License & Inspections will come and inspect your home for free. They will notify and work with the landlord around compliance issues. You may also report other structural issues like a leaking roof, missing windows, plumbing etc. to get connected with resources the City is currently offering.

For Asthma Home Visits and Classes

Emergency leak repairs

If you are a homeowner and are experiencing leaking or broken sewer lines, water service lines, or roof leaks causing at least 4 ft by 4 ft of damage you may be eligible for free repairs. Find out more at the following website:
