## Radon

### Did you know?

Radon is a colorless and odorless gas that can cause lung cancer.

### Action Plan

▶ Test your home, especially if you live below the second floor.

▶ To receive a free radon test kit, call 1-800-586-4872 or visit <https://www.lungradonkits.org/pa/>



▶ Have new homes tested for radon before moving in. This includes homes built to be resistant to radon.

▶ Using a DEP radon certified contractor, install a radon reduction system if high levels are detected. Avoid using areas with high levels of radon for sleeping or play until you fix it.

▶ Do not smoke. Radon increases your risk and your family's risk of lung cancer, especially if you are a smoker.
